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Spirituality and prayer life for School Sisters of Notre Dame

“Presence to and for one another, through our prayer, dialogue, and ministry, we become a community of one mind and one heart.” ~ You Are Sent, C 7

Below is a reflection by Sister Joyce Kolbet, of Mankato, Minnesota. Sister Joyce shares the importance of music throughout her life, how music deepens her spirituality and is a form of prayer.

Music: A vital organ

A reflection by Sister Joyce Kolbet

Throughout my life I have experienced music as food for my soul and a way of bonding with others. My dad was a guitarist and loved to sing. Mom was a pianist and very involved as a cantor and choir member at our home parish. It was a given that my sister Kay and I would learn piano and organ from childhood.

One of my attractions to the SSND was my weekly piano lesson

with Sister Therese Marie Merth. Beginning in grade three, I rode my bike to the convent each Saturday for my lesson. Sister Therese Marie, then age 20, warmly welcomed me into the sisters’ home. The “piano parlor” was directly across from the small chapel where I often noticed the other sisters quietly praying. I was struck that my lessons never seemed to disturb them. Years later some of the sisters told me they made my music their prayer. By that time, this was a life lesson I had already discovered.

Whether as a teacher, campus minister, hospice chaplain, vocation minister, pastoral associate or in my current ministry with caregivers and older adults, music is one of my vital organs (no pun intended). Accompanying and song-leading for weekend liturgies and funerals at my local parish, playing piano for SSND celebrations, singing at the bedside of a dying loved one, playing or singing familiar tunes with caregivers and their spouses with dementia – all of these ARE my prayer and an integral part of my spirituality. Music helps me embrace the sacred within and around me – receiving ALL as gift from my Creator.

In October of 2022, I had one of these sacred

experiences when dear friends from Good Thunder, Minnesota, where I had served in music and pastoral ministry, and SSND friends and classmates drove to my home parish in Cresco, Iowa, to assist with music ministry for my mother’s funeral. At the age of 85, Sister Therese Marie was among them to play the piano for Mass. What a beautiful tribute to mom and a treasured gift to me. Music was the thread that united us and made God deeply present at this tender time in my life. ●

The Mankato Riverblenders, a barbershop chorus, selected Sister Joyce Kolbet to receive the **Award of Harmony**. The person selected, “creates harmony in our community and makes a significant contribution to all of us by what they have done.” Since 1980, they have recognized outstanding community leaders, business people, educators, volunteers, artists and musicians. ●

Sister Mary Gilda Sturino told her parents that she wanted to be a School Sister of Notre Dame (SSND) when she was 13 years old. She entered the SSND after high school and professed her vows in 1945. Sister Mary Gilda will celebrate her 99th birthday in August 2023.

Praying the rosary is a tradition instilled by Sister Mary Gilda's mother. She and her siblings would pray the rosary in English and her mother would answer in Italian.

Sister Mary Gilda prays the rosary daily at Trinity Woods, Milwaukee, where those in attendance join her. When praying the rosary, her intentions are focused on the SSND benefactors

and always for peace in the world, knowing that people should never resort to war.

I put my hands together and ask, 'Lord, help me to receive what you have prepared for me today.' I know that this conversation, the bingo games, everything that is in all actuality God's presence." Sister Mary Gilda added she is very grateful for her life and all of God's gifts. ●





Spiritual leadership is living the Spirit's call and leading with a spirit of giving and receiving. Leading with a spirit of excitement! ●




Sister Anna Marie Reha

Spiritual direction is a profound experience

Being a spiritual director was a dream of Sister Sandy Bay, but after becoming a School Sister of Notre Dame (SSND) in 1966, she worked as an English teacher in elementary and secondary schools. In 1973, she participated in a spiritual direction program. This set the stage for her life's work.

Sister Sandy said, "It was a profound experience for me of God's love. And I knew immediately I wanted to do this work. I wanted to be able to provide whatever I could to help other people have that kind of experience of God's love." Today, Sister Sandy is a Spiritual Director at Mercy Conference and Retreat Center located in St. Louis.

At Mercy Center, Sister Sandy works closely with people participating in retreats, providing spiritual guidance while helping them navigate life's obstacles. Sister Sandy said, "My role is to listen and accompany them. And sometimes I make suggestions."

Sister Sandy shared how spiritual guidance changed one woman's life, "This woman was in turmoil because

she was adopted as an infant. She never knew her birth mother. It was still a deep wound. She wanted more contact with her mother, but her mother didn't want it. She had to accept that. The thought came to me to suggest she imagine the scene of her birth - that Jesus was right there with the midwife: She was born, the midwife handed her to her birth mother and then her birth mother handed her to Jesus, who then handed her to her adopted mother. This exercise brought the woman to tears and shifted her thought process to realize it was God's plan that she would be with her adopted parents, with whom she had such a wonderful relationship." ●

As the sisters embark on 190 years as a congregation (and having just celebrated 175 years in North America), they have an abundance of blessings, beginnings and milestones to celebrate.

In June, graduations are celebrated around the country. When I think of the sheer number of graduates that were able to receive a diploma due to the extraordinary education they received from the sisters, it is truly mind boggling and amazing. By 1892, Mother Caroline, the North American Foundress, opened over 220 schools. Sisters have taught in 43 states and provinces throughout the U.S. and Canada, totaling over 1,000 schools. Though we don't have an exact number, we know the sisters have educated over 1,000,000 youth who

have gone on to help others reach their fullest potential.

Throughout the past 190 years, SSND has adapted to fit the needs of the world they serve. **The values they've instilled in the students they taught are like ripples spreading to the families, communities, and world around us.**

I have heard hundreds of stories from former students of how a sister made them "who they are today," but it doesn't just end with one person. Those students became parents, grandparents, community and business leaders, educators, doctors and so much more. We will never be able to fully comprehend the impact. Instead, we rejoice that the sisters are still able to continue their service to others today. This work may look different

to us now, but it comes from the same source of love, prayer and unity, and it still leads us to a brighter future together.

We are grateful that you continue to celebrate and support each of our milestones with us. In the words of Blessed Theresa...

"No matter how much it storms outside, our congregation will stand firm and continue to flourish as long as we persevere in holy love among ourselves."




